When we do try to talk to people who disagree with us, it feels like we're talking past, rather than to, each other. Too often public discourse is disrespectful, angry, or even threatening. Many of us are tempted to give up on controversial discussions altogether.

Try to understand how other people's views might inform your own





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We often disagree about what key concepts mean, how to weigh competing values, and how to evaluate the evidence. Civil discourse requires that we remain open to the possibility that people we disagree with might have something to teach us.


If someone offends you, be prepared to accept a sincere apology

Sometimes we look for reasons to dismiss rather than engage those who disagree with us. Civil discourse requires that we try to understand where people are coming from and accept that we all sometimes make mistakes.

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Don't be hostile or defensive when your views are challenged

It is sometimes tempting to make claims that we can't back up with good evidence, and to try to talk over or shut down people who disagree with us. Civil discourse requires that we proportion our claims to the available evidence and allow others to challenge our beliefs and values even when it makes us feel uncomfortable or angry.

# Responding to others

### Practicality

Look for opportunities to work toward common ground

### be Constructive

Remember that the goal is not to win, but to promote better understanding

### Flexibility

Be prepared to change your views

A democracy whose citizens aren't able to communicate across lines of disagreement lacks a healthy civic culture. Civil discourse requires that we remain open-minded and committed to working together to address important problems.









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# Responding to others

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Taken together, the 4Cs give us a concrete and practical set of guidelines for conducting ourselves in civil discourse, both as we engage with others, and as we respond to them.
